


## Levels of Learning

Freshman to Senior

**Freshman Level** – Your dog is just starting to understand what *both* the **word** and **hand signal** mean

- They need lots of reminders and a lot of treat reinforcement at this stage
- It's crucial to pair your marker word (like "Yes!") with a treat to build strong associations
- Practice frequently so your dog links the word, your energy, and the tasty reward

To progress from Freshman to Senior Level, add in

Duration Distance Distractions


1 at a time, as your dog excels, add a second, then a 3<sup>rd</sup>

Be sure to practice in different environments, situations etc

**Sophomore Level** – Your dog can perform the behavior, but it's not perfect yet they might still get distracted

- A Sophomore-level "Come" might mean your dog responds, but slowly, or stops to sniff on the way
- Keep using frequent reminders and reinforcements to build reliability
- Try alternative motivators (tug, ball, love) on occasion to start building their power

Once your dog performs the behavior successfully 8 out of 10 times (80%), move to the next level.



**Turtle's Pace** for kids but also relevant for dogs

Junior Level – The behavior becomes more automatic and polished

- Your dog responds more smoothly and quickly, with less hesitation or thinking
- A Junior-level "Come" is when the dog comes with minimal distraction or delay
- You should be using non-food motivators more and more often at this stage

Struggling?

Go back a bit to show them they have it!

Senior Level – The behavior is clean, smooth, and highly reliable

- A Senior-level "Come" means your dog responds immediately and consistently (95% or more of the time), even with distractions around
- Food treats are only used to emphasize exceptional behavior or esp difficult situations from here on out
